



F rom the Head Welcome to Troy Feener

We have been fortunate in hiring Troy Feener as an excellent replacement for Blake Gubbins. Troy started working in the department on February 13, 2001.

Troy has a B.Sc. in Zoology and M.Sc. in Parasitology from the University of Calgary. During his training he has learned a variety of techniques through using tissue samples for research purposes. He also has experience in multiple aspects of microscopy, photography and computer graphics. Earlier this year Troy was an instructor in Human Physiology in the Nursing department at Loyalist College.

Troy and John DaCosta now have complementary skill sets. John will be concentrating on the electron microscopy, histopathology and other tissue related work. Troy will have primary responsibility for the work related to the NCIC Clinical Trials Group, plastination, imaging and photography, and will also act as the Safety Officer for Richardson Laboratory. We have been fortunate that Blake is available part-time to facilitate Troy's acclimatization and to ensure continuity of our services in the short term.

Troy is very enthusiastic and capable and I would encourage Faculty to consider his involvement in new departmental projects.

Richardson Labs Closure Monday April 16th

The building will be closed from 06:30 until AT LEAST 12:00 on Monday April 16th due to the work on the power grid in Botterell Hall.

Queen's Physical Plant/Security will be on hand to ensure that no one is in the building during the closure (security/fire and personal safety issues)

All electrical equipment must be turned off prior to 06:30 (? There may be surges/brownouts?)

Annual Reports

It's that time of year again!! Annual Reports for the 2000 calendar year are once again due in the Faculty Office. If you are a basic scientist (QUFA faculty) then your report will already have been completed and forwarded to the Faculty Office on the February 1st deadline. If you are a clinician then your report is due in the Faculty Office March 30th, 2001. The template

The form was updated (year changed, MRC changed to CIHR, etc) but the questions and content remain the same as last year. As the Head of the Department is required to prepare an appraisal form for each faculty member and include it with the Annual Report, you must submit both the report and your curriculum vitae **in duplicate** to Dr. Manley at least **one day** prior to your scheduled appointment with him. Also, please put an updated copy of your CV on the net under: G:/sec/cvs/2000/lastname.

TIPS

TIPS for Faculty will be held March 22nd and 23rd this year. At this workshop we explore various aspects of teaching and learning, including:

- teaching is not telling or speaking to people, but speaking with people in order to facilitate their learning.
- how to write effective learning objectives that not only tell the learner what new skill or knowledge they should be able to do following the session, but also facilitate the lesson planning for the teacher.
- how to organize a session to optimize learning using the "set, body, closure" system.
- what makes visual aids effective or ineffective.
- how to use questioning to encourage active and interactive learning.
- how to give and receive feedback effectively.

From the Queen's University Senate Statement on Proposed Tuition 2001/2002

Graduate Programs:

Despite having no increase in 2000/2001, Queen's Graduate tuition fees remain among the highest in the Province. In order to remain competitive, and to ensure adequate funding for graduate students, it is

recommended that, once again, there be no adjustment to tuition fees in 2001/2002. The School of Graduate Studies and Research consulted all departments on this position. The result was an overwhelming consensus to keep fees at their current level.

Jobs Available


The Hospital for Sick Children

Applications are invited for an academic Hematopathologist at the Hospital for Sick Children. Responsibilities include assisting in the professional and academic direction of a full service Hematology Laboratory including molecular diagnosis and flow cytometry. Emphasis will be placed on diagnostic hematopathology and undergraduate and postgraduate teaching. Initiation of and participation in collaborative research and developmental programs would be expected. Research experience would be an asset.

Candidates must hold Canadian Specialty Certification or equivalent and be eligible to hold an Ontario medical license and be cross-appointed to the Department of Laboratory Medicine and Pathobiology, Faculty of Medicine, University of Toronto.

Email Viruses:

People keep sending and forwarding ad infinitum, ad nauseam, email messages about viruses and warnings and don't open this or do that.

PLEASE PLEASE PLEASE STOP!

Under no circumstances should you be sending or forwarding these to ANYONE, especially me. As a rule you can depend on the fact that **they are untrue** and strictly rumour/hoax based. In addition, the vast majority of viruses will be caught and stopped by our anti-virus protection and most of the common email viruses are targeted at users of MICROSOFT OUTLOOK, which we do not use for email.

Remember how to manually update your anti-virus program?

► Double click on the "Norton Anti-Virus Corporate Edition" golden shield icon on the lower right toolbar.

► Click on the "LiveUpdate" button

► Click on the "Next" button

Your Anti-Virus data file upgrade will soon be complete and updated with the latest in Virus identification

All members of the Queen's community are advised to keep doors locked when not in their office, rooms or homes. Please do not leave personal items unattended, even for a brief time. There were 109 reported incidents of thefts under \$5000 (not involving Queen's property) in 2000. There were 206 such incidents in 1998 and 276 in 1999.

There have been 45 theft and 44 Break & Enter incidents involving Queen's property in 2000.

There were 69 thefts & 34 B&Es in 1998 and 104 thefts & 34 B&Es in 1999. Note: City Police have recovered some items in the past but had no way of identifying them as Queen's property. See "Protect Yourself Against Equipment Theft" in Safety Tips & Products.

In particular two data projectors were stolen (removed from ceiling mounts in auditoriums!) last month.

Some points to note:


- The existing access cards continue to work

The laptop was diagnosed with bad memory and a new memory chip was installed on February 13th. Since I haven't had a trouble report from it since, I am assuming it is working just fine.


